Pastor's Perspective

The Greatest Christmas Gift!

Perhaps at this time of the year some people exhaust their limited resources on their Christmas 'to do list': Christmas lights need to be put up and to be hung outside the house or set up out on the lawn, Christmas cards and invitations need to be written and sent out, the shopping list of gifts for families and friends, the estimated number of people who will be coming or to be invited, and you're wondering who will invite you over and your family for a Christmas

meal this year, where you will be spending Christmas this year, and the list goes on. Most often the excitement of the Christmas Holidays turns out to be a bitter sweet experience to some families and relatives.

Sometimes the anticipation of the Christmas holiday can be very stressful. Besides the stressful mundane of the Christmas preparation with many details and demands, is a leery feeling, perhaps bitter sweet memories of the past Christmas with previous relationships that keep lurking at the back of your mind. It

maybe the fond memories of your childhood with your beloved, but now deceased, parents exchanging gifts with all your siblings who now live far away from home. The sweet memories of past Christmases appears vividly but only the reminiscence of the good old family time together.

The Christmas season can be both blessings and curses depending on your current situation whether you will be together with your family or away from your family. Some single parents may find Christmas

the most nerve wracking experience because of no family support for the children. They miss their father or mother because of marriage separation, deployment for war, death of the spouse, infidelity, divorce, or many other reasons. Some family find Christmas a family tradition of gift exchanges and memorable experiences. Laughter and songs of joy during family reunions fill the air.

Whatever Christmas scenario you could possibly imagine, Christmas is about giving up something of great value as a gift for someone you may know or to a stranger. The three strangers from the east, the wise men learned about Jesus who was to be born in Bethlehem, Judea. The wise men studied the messianic prophesies from reading and studying the writing of the prophets. The Scripture says

in Matthew 2: 10, 11; "When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceedingly great joy. And when they had come into the house, they saw the young Child with Mary His mother, and fell down and worshiped Him. And when they had opened their treasures, they presented gifts to Him: gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (NKJ). The three wise men were divinely led by the stars. The heavenly host inspired them to leave the comfort of their homes and travel so far, just to present their most valuable treasures as gifts to Jesus. The Christmas inspiration is the spirit driven aspiration to show kind-

ness and compassion to someone else that is not of your own race, family, people, religion, neighbor, or not even a relative. Whenever you are moved by the Holy Spirit to honor him or her who is not of your own with heavenly love, that is the spirit-led inspiration of Christmas.

The birth of Jesus Christ is the gift of God to the lost world of sin. Isaiah 6:9 says, "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Coun-

selor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace" (NKJ). Matthew 1: 22-23 says, "Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel, which is translated, God is with us." However, not all people got excited about the birth of Jesus. King Herod was driven by a jealous spirit and he

ordered all male children from new born to two years of age be killed. Matthew 2:18 says, "a voice was heard in Ramah, lamentation, weeping, and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children, refusing to be comforted, because

they are no more." (NKJ). Christmas is composed of bitter sweet memories of God's work of salvation to save every soul who inclines to accept God's greatest gift; Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem, Judea, "...for we have seen His star in the eastern sky and we have come to worship him." (Matthew 2:2)



The first project to serve the shelter was a women's clothing drive in which women of the church donated their clothing. The next step was to help the youngest and most helpless of the shelter with a diaper appeal.

It was only natural for Women's Ministries to support Veronica's Home of Mercy during the Christmas Season. Debra Olguin, the shelter's director, was contacted and soon a list of 35 children was

sent to Mary Lemos. That seemed like a big list for our little congregation but the Committee had a fundraising plan, a Bake Sale. With the money earned from the bake sale and cash donations from church members, the Teamsters Local #166, and a very generous anony-






